# ANTEATER EXPERIENCE

## 60th Anniversary of UC Irvine

Commemorating the 60th anniversary of UC Irvine (1965–2025), *Anteater Experience* traces more than six decades of campus development since UCI's site selection in 1960. Highlighting student life, sustainability, and landscape, this exhibit illustrates key features and milestones that have helped shape the campus culture and environment.

Using original campus photographs and documents, *Anteater Experience* demonstrates how UCI's layout and design, including its iconic circular shape and lush Aldrich Park, formed under the guidance of architect William Pereira. Once sprawling ranch lands, the campus now is home to an urban forest of more than 30,000 trees and plants. Protected natural open spaces also serve as important sites for research, community outreach, and conservation efforts.

With more than 36,000 students, 19,000 employees, and 240,000 alumni, UCI and UCI Health today have a \$7 billion annual economic impact in Orange County and \$8 billion annual economic impact on the state of California. Known for its sustainability and conservation efforts, UCI has transformed over the last 60 years into an internationally recognized research institution.

## 1. **1961 – FOUNDING LAND**

For \$1, the Irvine Company transferred 1,000 acres to the University of California for the future site of the UC Irvine campus. Architect William Pereira (left) was commissioned to develop the master plans for the new campus and the new City of Irvine. Daniel G. Aldrich (right) was appointed the founding chancellor.

## 2. **1964 – CAMPUS DEDICATION**

United States President Lyndon B. Johnson dedicated the campus.

Campus architect William Pereira chose the Brutalist style for the original eight campus buildings, which consist of large concrete boxes in 3D cast-concrete panels.

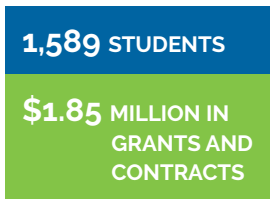

Academic program in social ecology launched, laying the foundation for the 1992 establishment of the nation’s first and only School of Social Ecology.

10. **1975 – POSTAL CODE**

Campus assigned its own postal code as enrollment reaches 9,547 students.

12. **1976 – MEDICAL CENTER**

UCI purchased the Orange County Medical Center, located 12 miles from the Irvine campus, renaming it the UCI Medical Center.

13. **1977 – FIRST FEMALE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR**

UCI became a member of NCAA Division I, and Linda Dempsay became the first female athletic director at a Division I institution.

UCI student enrollment diversified, with the highest minority student representation in the nation.

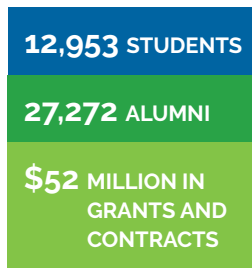

17. **1983 – NATIONAL MEDAL OF SCIENCE IN PHYSICAL SCIENCES**

Frederick Reines, distinguished professor of physics and founding dean of the School of Physical Sciences, awarded the National Medal of Science by President Ronald Reagan for his discovery of the neutrino and contributions to fundamental physics.

Patrick Hanratty (PhD '77) donated a copy of the First Folio, the first compilation of Shakespeare’s plays published in 1623, to UC Irvine Libraries. Today, the First Folio is the most expensive piece of literature ever auctioned.

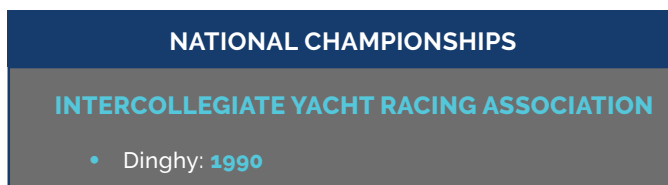

UC Irvine Founding Dean of Physical Sciences Frederick Reines won the Nobel Prize for his discovery of the neutrino, which he called “the most tiny quantity of reality ever imagined by a human being.”

## 25. **1995 – NOBEL PRIZE IN CHEMISTRY**

Professor of Chemistry F. Sherwood Rowland won the Nobel Prize for his work on how ozone forms and breaks down in the atmosphere. Along with UC Irvine graduate student Mario Molina, his 1973 discoveries led to the worldwide regulation of chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs) and other ozone-depleting chemicals.

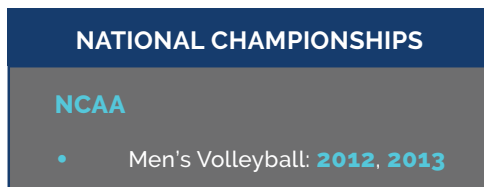

UC Irvine School of Law opened, the first public law school to open in California in 40 years. Its inaugural class of 2012 had a 90% pass rate for the California Bar Exam.

33. **2011 – FIRST LEED PLATINUM BUILDING**

Humanities Gateway completed, UC Irvine's first Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Platinum building. Today, the campus has 32 LEED Platinum and Gold buildings, which focus on human and environmental health.

38. **2015 – BRILLIANT FUTURE CAMPAIGN**

UC Irvine launched Brilliant Future, the largest fundraising and alumni effort in Orange County’s history. The campaign reached its goals in January 2025, raising \$2 billion and engaging over 75,000 alumni, eight months ahead of schedule.

Orange County & Southeast Asian Archive Center (OC&SEAA) opened, becoming the home of the UC Irvine Libraries Southeast Asian Archive (SEAA) and Orange County Regional History Collection.

41. **2016 – ESPORTS PROGRAM**

UC Irvine Esports Arena opened, and Esports program established, the first at a public university. Students in the program have won national championships and major tournaments while maintaining a graduation rate of 94%, a number unmatched in college esports.

42. **2016 – ASIAN AMERICAN AND NATIVE AMERICAN PACIFIC ISLANDER–SERVING INSTITUTION**

UC Irvine named an Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander-Serving Institution (AANAPISI), meaning a minimum of one-tenth of its full-time undergraduate students identify as Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander.

43. **2017 – HISPANIC-SERVING INSTITUTION**

UCI named a Hispanic-Serving Institution (HSI), meaning a minimum of one-fourth of its full-time undergraduate students identify as Hispanic. UCI's Latinx Resource Center opened shortly after in 2021.

44. **2020 – COVID-19 PANDEMIC**

Responding to the developing COVID-19 emergency, the main Irvine campus closed on March 19. Only a small number of residential students and essential staff and researchers remained on campus.

45. **2020 – BLACK LIVES MATTER PROTESTS**

Black Lives Matter demonstrators held a rally at the UCI Health Medical Center in Orange. Later in 2020, the UC Irvine Athletics’ Anteater Voices for Change and UC Irvine’s Black Thriving Initiative were developed.

Academic workers held a six-week strike, the largest of its kind in US history. Striking workers, including graduate researchers, teaching assistants, and postdoctoral fellows, demanded higher salaries and more affordable housing.

48. **2024 – ZOTGPT CHAT**

ZotGPT Chat introduced, one of the first customized generative AI tools in the UC system. Developed for UCI affiliates, the tool allows users to explore AI in a secure environment.

49. **2024 – HEALTH ACQUISITIONS**

UCI Health acquired four hospitals and associated outpatient locations from Tenet Healthcare, adding nearly 860 inpatient beds.

50. **2025 – UCI HEALTH — IRVINE MEDICAL CAMPUS FULLY OPEN**

Seven-story, 350,000-square-foot, acute care hospital and emergency department at the north end of the UC Irvine campus scheduled to be complete in 2025. The new 1.2-million-square-foot medical center campus, the nation’s first to be powered by an all-electric central utilities plant, is also the home of the Joe C. Wen & Family Center for Advanced Care and the Chao Family Comprehensive Cancer Center and Ambulatory Care building.

# STUDENT LIFE

## 51. **1965 – ANTEATER MASCOT**

In 1965, with a 56% majority of students' votes, the Anteater officially became UC Irvine's mascot, modeled after Johnny Hart's B.C. comic strip anteater character, and "Zot" the official "war-cry." UCI's administration desired a "respectable" mascot, but students were steadfast to elect a unique mascot that set Irvine apart.

## 52. **1965 – ASSOCIATED STUDENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, IRVINE**

Founded in 1965, the undergraduate student government ASUCI provides student representation and puts on student programming like vendor fairs and the Summerlands and Aldrich Park After Dark concerts. Ron Ridgle, the only Black student enrolled when UCI opened, was elected ASUCI president in 1968 on a platform addressing student government finances.

## 53. **1968 – NEW UNIVERSITY**

The UCI student newspaper, *New University*, was established in 1968. Originally a print newspaper, *New University* is now entirely online and shares everything from videos and comics to opinion pieces, sports, arts and entertainment, and campus news.

54. **1969 – KUCI FM**

UCI's student radio station KUCI FM was founded in 1969. Before its transition to a FM dial, it was broadcasted as an AM station from a UCI dorm in 1968.

55. **1971 – WAYZGOOSE**

One of UCI's oldest traditions, the student-run Wayzgoose festival began in 1971. The festival adopted Renaissance Faire lore on the UCI grounds, and students dressed up in medieval gear and jousted.

56. **1973 – GREEK LIFE**

Greek Life at UCI started in 1973 with the formation of three sororities (Delta Gamma, Pi Beta Phi, and Gamma Phi Beta) and three fraternities (Beta Theta Pi, Sigma Chi, and Phi Delta Theta). Today, the Greek community has more than 1,400 students in 36 sororities and fraternities representing a wide range of ethnicities, cultures, and backgrounds.

57. **1974 – CROSS-CULTURAL CENTER**

The UCI Cross-Cultural Center (CCC), founded in October 1974, was the first multicultural center at a UC campus. Today, five student umbrella organizations continue to be recognized by the Cross-Cultural Center: Black Student Union (BSU), Alyansa ng mga Kababayan, American Indian Student Association (AISA), Asian Pacific Student Association (APSA), and Movimiento Estudiantil Chicanx de Aztlan (MEChA).

58. **1981 – UNIVERSITY CENTER**

The first UCI Student Center, opened in 1981 and originally named the University Center, housed a bookstore, restaurant, and a few common areas. With additions and expansions in 1982, 1990, and 2007, the center today hosts student events and conferences and houses ASUCI, the LGBT Resource Center, and the Veteran Services Center, among other student services.

58. **1990 – SHANTYTOWN**

In 1990, UCI students demanded changes to campus housing policies for domestic partnerships. On February 5, 150 demonstrators set up a “shantytown,” living inside cardboard boxes to draw attention to campus housing issues.

59. **1993 – ASIAN AMERICAN STUDIES STRIKE**

Asian American students mounted a 35-day hunger strike in 1993, demanding the foundation of an Asian American studies program. Following the strike, an Asian American studies major was offered in 1997, and Asian American studies became a department in 2003.

60. **1995 – AFFIRMATIVE ACTION STRIKE**

On July 20, 1995, the UC Regents voted 15–10 to eliminate affirmative action. At UCI, protesters against the decision set up tents outside the administration building and organized hunger strikes. The students’ hunger strike eventually extended to the California State Capitol.

61. **2000 – ANTEATER RECREATION CENTER**

The Anteater Recreation Center (ARC) was built in 2000 to enhance the campus community through recreational sports and fitness activities. Home to intramural sports, club sports, and classes, it is also the location of the annual Late Night at the ARC open house event.

62. **2010 – Black Wednesday Protest**

During a Black Wednesday protest in 2010, UCI students lined up and linked arms, back-to-back near the entrance of the Student Center courtyard. The silent protest held by the Black Student Union (BSU) was part of UC-wide student efforts to raise awareness about police brutality, anti-Blackness, Black identity and visibility, and institutional support for Black students.

63. **2010 – GUINNESS WORLD RECORDS**

In 2010, UCI students set their first Guinness World Record during Welcome Week for the largest game of dodgeball. Other records have included the world's largest pillow fight (2014), water gun fight (2013), and game of red light/green light (2022), to name a few.

64. **2017 – BASIC NEEDS CENTER**

In 2017, the FRESH Basic Needs Hub, a product of student advocacy, opened on campus as one of the largest facilities of its kind on a US college campus. Renamed the UCI Basic Needs Center in 2023, the center supports students' financial stability by ensuring equitable access to basic needs, including food assistance, financial literacy, mental health services, and more.

65. **2018 – PETR THE ANTEATR**

The Petr the Anteatr sticker phenomenon was originally created by UCI student Qasim Shareh, who was initially anonymous and known as “Original Petr” on social media. Shareh created and released 13 designs through sticker “drops” between September 2018 and June 2019. Because he made Petr’s design open source, other students have continued to create new Community Petrs.

66. **2020 – STARSHIP ROBOTS**

Starship robots began delivering food and packages on campus in 2020. Initially launched to deliver to sequestered students during COVID-19 restrictions, the autonomous “Zot Bots” use satellite imagery, radar, ultrasonic sensors, and machine-learning technologies to detect obstacles.

67. **2024 – ENCAMPMENT FOR GAZA**

An encampment was created at UCI on April 29, 2024 on Ring Road near Croul Hall and Rowland Hall in support of Gaza during the ongoing Israel-Palestine conflict. On May 15, 2024, local law enforcement broke up the encampment and made a number of arrests.

# UC IRVINE'S MASTER PLAN

**DUE TO A PROJECTED GROWTH IN STATE POPULATION AND UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA ENROLLMENTS FOLLOWING WORLD WAR II, CALIFORNIA BEGAN EXPLORING SITES FOR A NEW UC CAMPUS IN THE LATE 1950s.** From the 23 sites considered in the Los Angeles–Orange County area, portions of the Irvine Ranch were selected in 1960 for the new university because the site had, among other benefits, “desired nobility” and “great potential for development within a broad master plan framework.”

**ON JANUARY 20, 1961, 1,000 ACRES LOCATED SEVERAL MILES NORTH OF NEWPORT BEACH** were sold to the UC Regents for \$1 for the future site of UC Irvine. The 1963 land-use plan described the site as “gentle rolling land, with an inspiring outlook to the north and west over the Santa Ana Basin.”

**UC IRVINE'S 1963 LONG RANGE DEVELOPMENT PLAN** included areas for academic, housing, and commercial developments as well as landscaped and natural green spaces. The central campus's circular design – a central ring and six radial malls – was selected “as a response to the climate, soil conditions and site, and as a method of giving the campus a ‘heart’ and a strong sense of identity from its earliest years.” Several proposed park features never came to fruition, however, including a small lake and the Centrum, a 300-foot-tall freestanding bell tower.

# ALDRICH PARK

**ACCORDING TO UC IRVINE'S 1963 LAND-USE PLAN, THE IRVINE RANCH SITE DESIGNATED FOR THE CAMPUS CONSISTED OF ROLLING HILLS AND A "COMPLETE ABSENCE OF TREES."** The former cattle ranch lands were covered in naturalized and native grasses with pockets of coastal sage scrub. To mirror the land's natural topography, the campus buildings were arranged around an urban forest located at the heart of the campus.

# ENERGY-EFFICIENT TRANSPORTATION AND CONSTRUCTION

Campus-wide efforts to minimize UCI's ecological footprint and conserve finite resources began in the 1960s. Efforts today include the student-run Anteater Express, which provides more than 2 million rides annually and was the nation's first campus shuttle service to transition to an all-electric fleet in 2018. UCI's built environment also includes 32 Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Gold and LEED Platinum certified buildings, which focus on human and environmental health.

## 80. **UCI HEALTH — IRVINE**

Scheduled to be completed in 2025, the medical campus will be the first in the nation to operate on an all-electric central utilities plant.

# Protected Open Space

UC Irvine's earliest land-use plan set aside portions of the original 1,000 acres for permanent open spaces. Embedded within the urban Orange County landscape, two nature preserves are sites for ecology-focused, immersive education and research programs at UCI.

This 202-acre wetland habitat is home to dozens of animal and plant species. It is also a nesting site for 20 bird species and a critical stopping place for 100 migratory bird species.

# COVID-19 AT UC IRVINE

**LIFE AND LEARNING AT UCI WERE DEEPLY IMPACTED BY THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC.** In response to the growing global crisis, UCI initiated a campus-wide shutdown on March 19, 2020. Except for a small number of residential students, essential researchers, and medical staff, the Irvine campus was cleared, and all events and athletics were canceled. At the same time, UCI Health operations ramped up to meet community needs. Near-normal Irvine campus operations would not resume until late September 2021.

85. **COVID-19 TESTING AND SCREENING WERE IMPLEMENTED IN SPRING 2020** for the remaining residential students and essential staff and researchers. Nearly 75,000 vaccine doses were administered by UCI Health at the Bren Events Center in 2021.
